

Using IRUS-UK to develop an OA newsletter

from Aberystwyth University

Background

Aberystwyth University uses the Aberystwyth Research Portal to manage institutional research outputs. The University is keen to promote Open Access activity and ensure staff and students understand the systems they have available to support Open Access. To help achieve this, a regular newsletter incorporating statistics from IRUS-UK has been developed.

IRUS-UK reports used

Item Report 1 (IR1): for top downloads

ETD Report 1 (ETD1): for downloads of electronic theses and dissertations

Visualisations - Downloads by Country

Visualisations - Downloads by Item Type

How is IRUS-UK used?

Data from the IR1 report is used to identify the top five downloaded articles for each month. Data from the ETD1 report is used to identify the top five downloaded theses for each month. The title, author(s) and number of downloads as well as a link to the article/thesis are included in the newsletter.

In addition, the IRUS-UK visualisations functionality has been used to show graphics of Aberystwyth Research Portal's downloads by Country and downloads by Item Type.

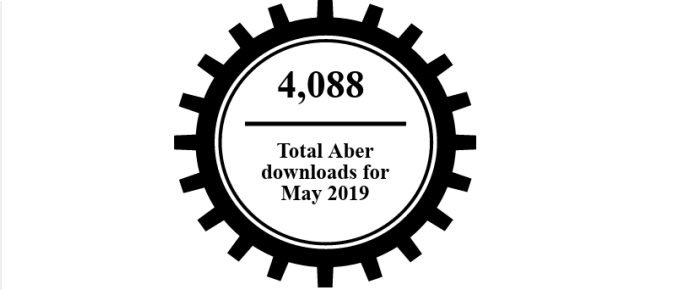


Image of the total portal downloads recorded in May 2019

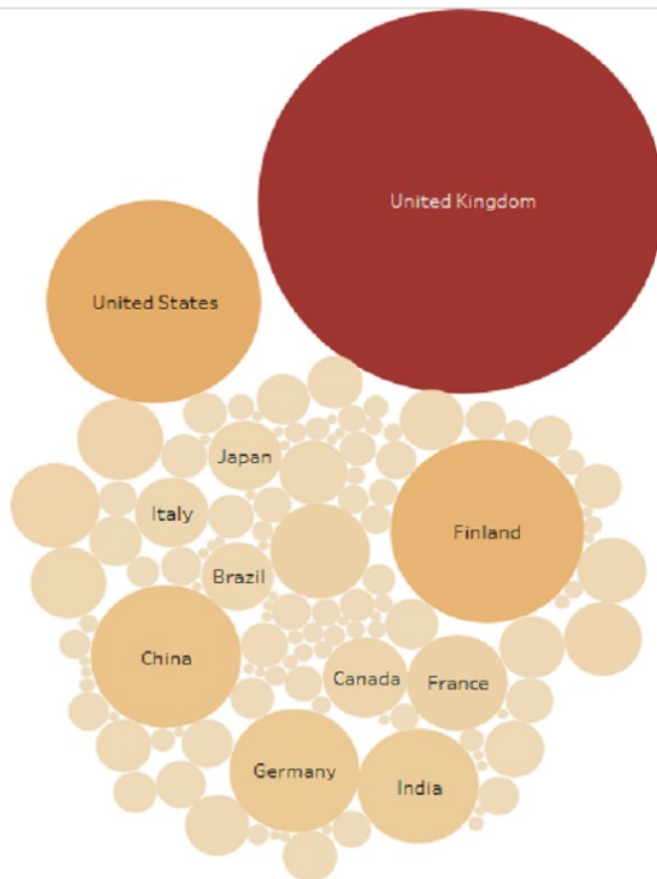


Image of 'Visualisations- Downloads by Country' for May 2019, source: [IRUS-UK](#)

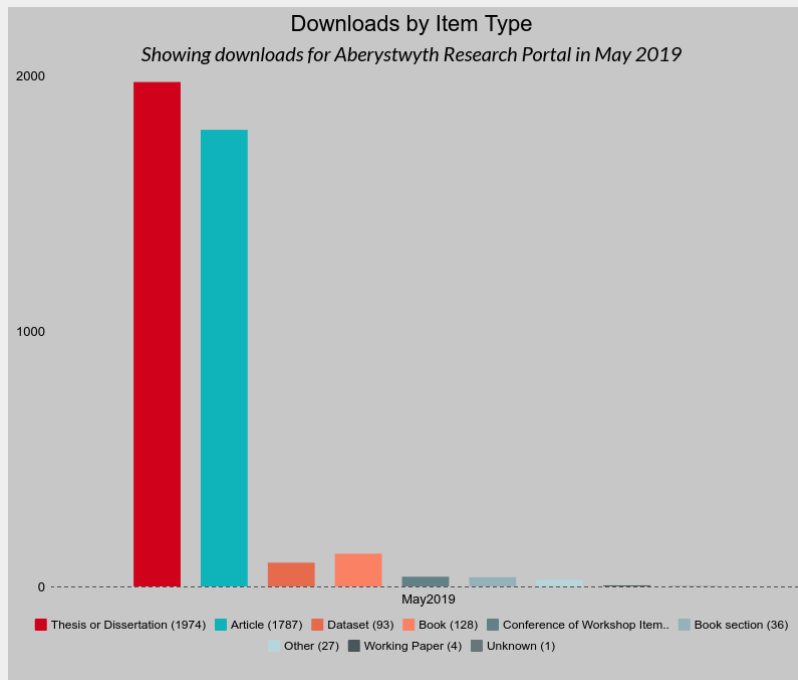


Image adapted from Visualisations- Downloads by Item Type for May 2019, source: [IRUS-UK](#)

Outcome

An infographic for the newsletter has been created using Piktochart. The newsletter is hosted on the Open Access blog and a headline and a link to the latest issue are included in the University-wide bulletins at the start of every month. The short newsletter is designed to be simple to compile; bilingual; accessible; reliable; easy to interpret; and easy to share. It names individuals to highlight their work and show others, within the institution, who is actively engaging with OA as well as provides examples of journals that colleagues are publishing OA in. The newsletter also includes information on where the data originated and links to IRUS-UK should individuals wish to visit IRUS-UK themselves.

The newsletter continues to promote Open Access awareness.
