Institutional Repositories Usage Statistics in the UK (IRUS-UK)

IRUS-UK collects raw usage data from UK Institutional Repositories (IRs) and processes these data into COUNTER-conformant statistics. This provides repositories with comparable, authoritative, standards-based data and opportunities for profiling at a national level. The IRUS-UK service is a community-driven development, responding to user needs.

Welcome to three new participants

The IRUS team would like to welcome our latest participating institutional repositories, meaning we currently have 149 institutional repositories:

- **Aberystwyth Research Portal** (Aberystwyth University)
- **Rothamsted Repository** (Rothamsted Research)
- **Queen Mary Research Online (QMRO)** (Queen Mary, University of London)

Of the 149 repositories we have 135 active repositories and 14 'retired' repositories. 'Retired' mostly refers to a repository that has changed platforms. We still hold all the data for the 149 repositories and this is always available in all our reports.

We currently support EPrints, DSpace, Pure portal, Fedora, Worktribe and Haplo.

New report 'Repository Report 3 (RR3)' showing from where in the world each item download request is made

We are pleased to announce our latest addition to the IRUS-UK collection. The report has proved useful already from an advocacy and promotional perspective.

Repository Report 3 – here you can view the number of successful item downloads by month and country, where the usage occurred, for all participating repositories. For each country the report shows the total download figures by month and in total for the period selected. It can be run for an individual month or over several months and can be output in HTML, CSV or TSV formats.

Bookmarks

The old URL, for the main website, will redirect however if you have any saved bookmarks for IRUS-UK from the old server (with 'mimas.ac.uk' as part of the URL), please note that these will no longer work. Please exchange them to match the new server and all our services, portal, statistics and reports etc. are accessible from the above link.

Tracker update

As a result of this change, we sent an email to the IRUS-UK mailing list at the end of March asking you, to update the tracker URL configuration for your repository, or repositories, so that your raw usage data is transmitted to the appropriate endpoint on the new IRUS server.

The email explains changes needed and how this varies slightly, depending on the software your repository uses. If you haven't seen this information and would like support then please contact our helpdesk help@jisc.ac.uk and could we ask you to add 'IRUS-UK' or 'IRUS' into the subject field.

Widget

A widget is being developed and tested at present and it is expected to be released imminently. This will enable IRUS-UK statistics to be embedded into institutional repositories. It has been requested by users and will offer greater flexibility to both access and use IRUS statistics.

COUNTER Release 5

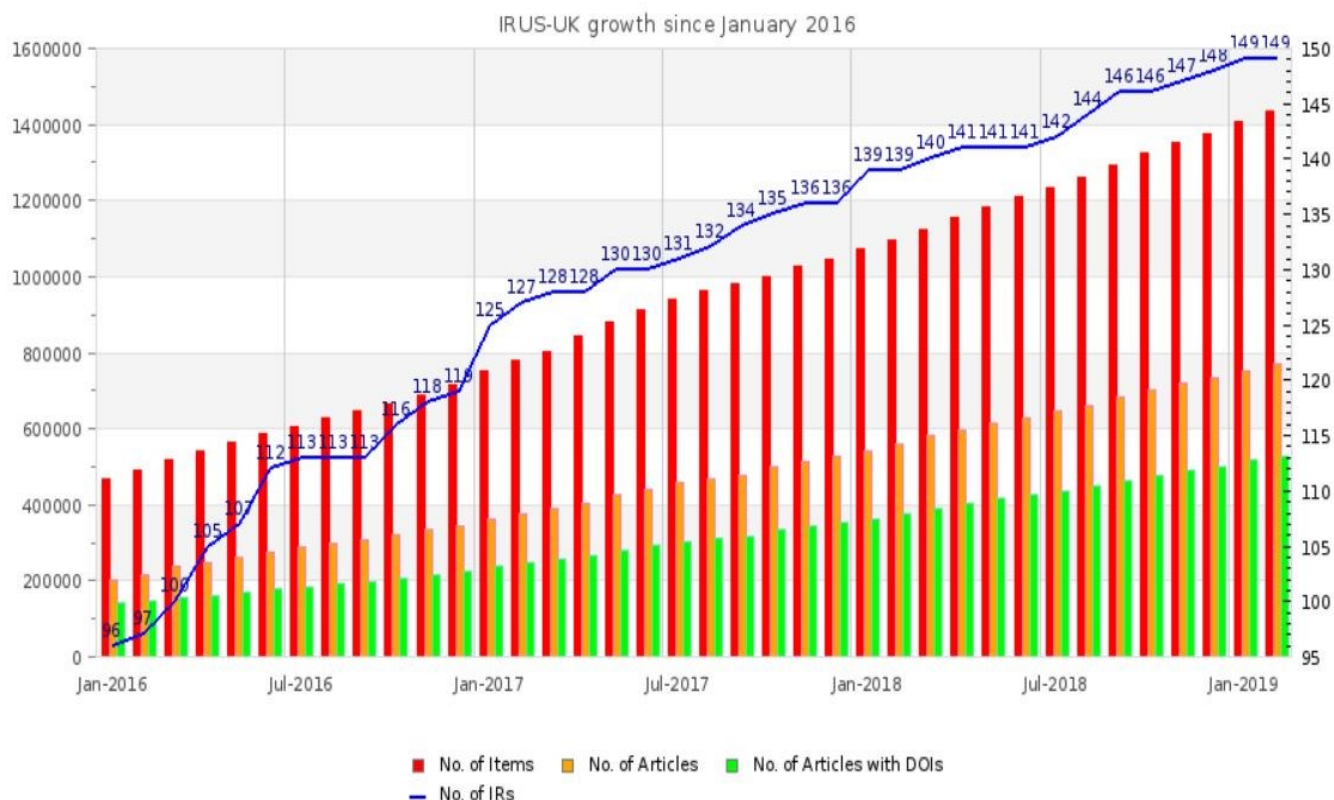
Developments to support IRUS in the transition to COUNTER Release 5 are underway.

Project Honey Pot is a free, distributed, web-based, open source system for identifying the IP addresses of spammers and spambots. IRUS-UK is participating in Project Honey Pot and has
