New helpdesk address for Jisc Services

Jisc has introduced a new centralised help desk for many of its services with a single point of contact: help@jisc.ac.uk. Institutional Repositories Usage Statistics in UK (IRUS-UK)

IRUS-UK collects raw usage data from UK Institutional Repositories (IRs) and processes these data into COUNTER-compliant statistics. This provides repositories with comparable, authoritative, standards-based data and opportunities for profiling at a national level. IRUS-UK is a community-driven development, responding to user needs.

Welcome to seven new participants

These include 4 Pure portal platforms; 2 EPrints and 1 in-house. The University of Strathclyde's KnowledgeBase joins Strathclyde Prints making this our 1st institution with both EPrints and Pure portal platforms participating.

OA week: Blog and new daily reports

A request came from one of our repositories, asking if it would be possible to provide daily stats as well as monthly ones. The two, brand new daily reports, **Item Report 1 Daily (IR1D)** and **Repository Report 1 Daily (RR1D)**, are now available in the portal and descriptions of them are available on the website in our Support section – Statistics and Reports:

Because our daily logs are so large we have chosen to make these daily reports available for a rolling six-week period so that you can view the results on a monthly basis, should you require, and have the first two weeks in the month to view the whole of the previous calendar month.

Top Downloads Report and enhanced search facility for DOIs and ORCIDs

We have just launched another new report. It is an addition to our range of Statistics Reports: ‘**Top Downloads Report**’. It is now available in the portal and a description of it is available on the website in our Support section – Statistics and Reports:

This report provides the top 10 or 20 item download requests by month and repository identifier for a selected repository. For each item, it shows the item URL, title, author(s), item type and total downloads by month and in total for the period selected. The report can also be filtered to limit the results to a selected item type.

We have enhanced our search options too. In the portal you can now click on ‘More search options’, just under the Search box, and then you can search by Title/Author; DOIs; and/or by ORCIDs across all repositories or one repository and across all or one item type.

IRUS-ANZ and IRUS-USA

The IRUS team is currently collaborating with the Council on Library and Information Resources (CLIR) and the Digital Library Federation (DLF) in the United States, and with CAVAL in Australia and New Zealand. Two pilot developments underway, known as IRUS-USA and IRUS-ANZ, are replicating the approach taken in the UK to explore opportunities for international analysis, comparison and benchmarking in order to demonstrate the impact of Open Access. This development is aiming to foster an international community of practice, to support use and provision of open metrics for open science.

Annual survey report 2017

The 2017 IRUS-UK Community Survey ran from January to March. Thank you to everyone who took the time to complete the survey and gave some useful feedback. Here are some of the key statistics:

- 93% of respondents were “very” or “fairly” satisfied with IRUS-UK
- 84% of respondents felt IRUS-UK has improved their statistical reporting
- 67% of respondents consider that IRUS-UK has enabled reporting that they could not do previously
- 33% of respondents use IRUS-UK for benchmarking

When asked to consider the best thing about IRUS-UK the responses covered the following themes:

- Reliable/authoritative statistics
- Reporting
- Easy to use/access
- Comparing data
- Specific features of IRUS-UK

When asked if they would recommend IRUS-UK to a colleague, all respondents said that they would. Some very useful suggestions for the development of IRUS-UK were made, including:


- Data visualisations
- More case-studies
- Making IRUS-UK mobile friendly
- Bite size videos about the use of reports
